The Lowell School District has often been associated with catch phrases like "we are on the move" and "a private school education with a small school feel." But what do these things mean? For the Lowell School Board, the administration, and the staff, it means that we always want to be moving forward and striving for the best for our students.

Recently, our school district has grown to add classrooms, and lower class sizes. We have added three new positions at the elementary school and two new positions plus a counselor at the high school.

Studies show that class size does make a difference. With the help of the Early Literacy Grant, we have taken steps to lower the student teacher ratio in our classrooms. With smaller classes, the teachers are better able to meet the needs of the students, establish better relationships, manage behaviors, and increase literacy.

Students who read at grade level by third grade will most likely do well throughout their educational career. With lower class sizes in our elementary grades, we will have a much better chance of meeting and maintaining that standard.

In our high school, it is important to continue to add classes to keep our students interested in learning and continue to make the path to graduation more engaging. We have added teachers with endorsements in science and social studies. Previously, only one teacher was available in each of those areas of study. This will afford our students more opportunities to learn about a wider range of topics in these subjects. Along with teachers, we have also added additional classrooms and will begin making another classroom space ready for this fall.

Every year, we keep working to get better. This year is no different, we are still on the move.

### SOFTBALL ALL-STATE AWARDS

Awards have continued to roll in for our outstanding softball team after yet another trip to the state tournament;

### ATHLETES & COACH OF THE YEAR

Rowan Files, a senior, was named Lowell High School's Male Athlete of the Year for the second time. As a three-sport Varsity athlete, Rowan went to state in football, basketball, and track all while maintaining a spot on honor roll. He helped his team win the football state championship and was named 1st Team All-State Tight End, 1st Team All-State Linebacker, and the All-State Defensive Player of the Year after leading the 2A division in tackles this season with 117. In basketball, Rowan earned 2nd Team All-League recognition as his team finished in the top 16 of the state tournament. And in track, Rowan was a team captain who placed in three district events (100m, 4x100m, javelin) and placed 3rd in state at the 100m. During the season, Rowan set the all-time school record for both the 100m and 200m with times of 11.2 and 22.9, respectively.



Amerika Baszler, a senior, is Lowell's Female Athlete of the Year. Amerika was a Varsity star and team captain in both volleyball and softball while also staying on honor roll. In volleyball, Amerika earned 1st Team All-League honors while playing the setter and outside hitter positions. She helped her team finish 2nd in league and 6th in state. Adding to that in softball, the team finished 2nd in league with Amerika earning 1st Team Outfielder and Player of the Year awards. Continuing to state, the team reached the top 16, where Amerika was recognized again with 1st Team All-State Outfielder honors.

Ray Yarbrough was named Lowell's Coach of the Year for his effort and success with our football team. He ended his first year as Lowell's head coach with an undefeated regular season, a league championship, and Lowell's first ever football state championship. Coach Yarbrough was also named the OACA 2A Football Coach of the Year. He is loved by his athletes and is recognized for his year-round dedication to his sport.

**Election season is underway.** It's election season, and we have three positions that will be on the November ballot: positions 2, 3, and 5. When running for election, candidates must declare which specific position number they are running for. Each member serves a four-year term and they do not get paid for their service.

For more information on how to run for the above positions, please refer to the "Candidate Filing Instructions" on the city website at https://www.ci.lowell.or.us/citycouncil/page/city-council-election-information. You can also pick up a candidate packet at City Hall. The city must receive all documentation of candidacy by 5:30 p.m. on August 27, 2024.

What are the requirements to run for election to Lowell City Council? You must be registered to vote in the State of Oregon. And, you must have resided within Lowell city limits a minimum of 12 months preceding the election.

**Navigating city management.** It has occurred to me that some of you may be wondering what a City Administrator does, and I often get asked that when people outside of work inquire about what I do for a living. I thought I'd take a moment to explain the role and its importance to our community.

What does the City Administrator do? The City Administrator's responsibility is to oversee the day-to-day operations of our city, ensuring that everything runs smoothly and efficiently. Here are some key responsibilities:

City Operations. Managing and overseeing all aspects of our city's operations, from public works to community development.

Policy Implementation. Working closely with our City Council to implement their policies and decisions.

Financial Management. Preparing and managing our city budget, ensuring that taxpayer funds are used wisely and effectively. This also includes procuring goods and services and managing contracts.

Public Relations. Handling public relations and serving as a point of contact for any concerns or issues you may have regarding our city.

Intergovernmental Coordination. Coordinating with various local, state, and federal officials to ensure cohesive and effective governance.

Reporting and Recommendations. Providing regular updates to the City Council on the city's status and making recommendations for improvements as needed.

What's in a Name? You may have heard the terms "City Administrator" and "City Manager" used interchangeably. In our city, the role of City Administrator encompasses the same responsibilities typically associated with a City Manager in other cities.

# **Back Yard Burning Season Closed**

Just a reminder that the back yard burn season is closed. Outdoor burning of tree trimmings and yard debris is now prohibited. Recreational fires are still permitted as long as the fire is no larger than four square feet, with flames no higher than four feet in height. The fire must be built on bare ground (dirt), and away from combustible surroundings. The material being burned must be clean and dry, producing little to no smoke or embers. There must be a person in attendance at all times while the fire is active. For more information contact the Fire District Office at 541 -937-3393 or the Oregon Department of Forestry at 541-726-3588.

As the weather gets warmer and drier, <u>all</u> outdoor burning is likely to be prohibited, so stay informed and check the burning regulations often.

# **Think Water Safety This Summer**

In recent weeks the district has participated in a number of water rescue incidents that included overturned rafters in the Middle Fork of the Willamette River, to boating accidents in our local lakes. We would like to remind everyone to be smart in and around water.

Whether at home or enjoying our local waterways, it is always important to keep safety in mind when in or near water. Drowning can happen at any time of year, but be especially cautious during the summer months when drowning incidents can increase by as much as 89% as compared to the rest of the year.






When the weather turns warm, as it is now, everyone naturally wants to be in or around the water to help stay cool. Hanging out at the pool or the lake on a hot day is a great way to beat the heat. For people between the ages of 5 and 24, drowning is the second leading cause of accidental death.

It doesn't have to be that way, though. Most water-related accidents could be avoided by knowing how to stay safe and following a few simple guidelines. Learning how to swim is essential if you plan on being on or near water. Many organizations provide swim instruction to folks of all ages, check to see what classes are available in our area.
