City Administrator Annual Report

The City Council and staff are focused on developing a sustainable organization. This means building a solid foundation through effective financial management, project planning, staff training and development.

In 2018, the City focused on major planning efforts for improvements to our downtown, parks, community facilities, and public safety services. A more detailed list of accomplishments is provided below:

Community Development

- Started development of the City's first Downtown Master Plan.
- Awarded contract for a Community Facilities Study to plan for future public facilities (i.e., City Hall and Library).
- Coordinated volunteer beautification projects in Rolling Rock Park and at the Wastewater Plant with the Lowell School District, Bridge Charter Academy, and Mountain View Academy.

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LOWELL SCHOOLS: We're on the Move...

School Attendance-Every Day Matters!

Traditionally the months of January and February take "a hit" in student attendance due to student illness and other reasons. This month we are taking time to remind parents about the importance of school attendance. If students miss 10% or more of school days (about 17 days in our schools), they are considered to be chronically absent and are at high risk of falling behind. Missed days add up quickly. For example missing two days a week can easily put a child's academic achievement at risk.

Research clearly indicates that students who do not miss school get better grades, behave better in school and at home, and are more likely to attend college or career training leading to higher paying jobs as adults. Students who do not attend school on a regular basis do not perform up to their ability and have a higher risk of dropping out of school. If your child has minor complaints about his/her health, you should send him/her to school. If he/she has a fever (or has had a fever in the last 24 hours) or is vomiting, then clearly he/she should stay at home. If a doctor advises staying at home, he/she should do so. Otherwise, students should be at school. Parents can help with attendance by:

- 1. Stressing the importance of attending school every day and working hard while at school;
- 2. Making appointments outside of the school day if possible;
- 3. Making sure students are well rested on school nights to be mentally alert during school days; and,
- 4. Contacting the school counselor, teachers, and administrators when your student needs academic help.

If a student does become ill and needs to stay home, please be sure to call the school secretaries to excuse the absence and to work to determine a way for your student to make up any missing work. If a student is out of class for academic or athletic reasons (like fieldtrips or athletic competitions), please help remind your student to request homework for the time they are out of class prior to leaving the school.

As always, we would like to give a big "shout out" to our parents and community for your continued support of our students and school programs. You are an integral part of our team in the education of our youth.

Senior Projects Almost Complete

In one month (by the end of January) all of Lowell will hear a "collective sigh of relief" coming from the 2019 senior class. Every year the seniors at Lowell complete a senior project that entails a career research paper, internships, job shadows, or product creation, and a 10-15 minute presentation to a panel of three judges and often an audience of 25 or more other students listening to the presentation. No amount of moaning and groaning gets the seniors out of this as-



signment. The senior project is an assignment that meets several local and state requirements for graduation. This year the seniors are researching and completing a wide variety of career projects including construction, psychology, engineering, medical field, EMT, forestry, veterinary technician, architecture, electrician/lineman, mechanic, dentistry, industrial pipe fitting, athletic trainer, furniture design, gaming, video animation, photography, food service industry, and music arrangement and performance. While seniors may be stressed about this now, by the time they finish (if they are like previous senior classes), they will count this assignment as one of the most worthwhile projects they completed in high school. The senior project is designed to be both rigorous and relevant to the students' futures.

Many members of the community have helped the seniors by either providing opportunity for job shadows or internships. Some community members and teachers have volunteered to serve as mentors to the students. Our thanks goes out to all of those who have helped seniors with their projects. We greatly appreciate your willingness to serve.

Academic New Year's Resolutions

It's that time of year again...the time that we all sit down and make goals for self-improvement for the coming year...better known as "New Year's Resolutions". This year the students at Lowell in grades 7-12 will be making academic resolutions to try to improve their overall grade performance for Semester One. This report of actions by the City Council is provided to inform citizens of recent decisions made by the council.

On December 4th, the following meetings were held:

Executive session:

Reviewed and evaluated the employment-related performance of the chief executive officer, City Administrator Jared Cobb

Special meeting:

- Approved Resolution 708—Designating Settlement Funds for Public Facilities. The \$330,000 settlement funds will be deposited into the General Fund, to be spent on a Capital Expense.
- Approved a motion to authorize the City Administration to enter into negotiations to acquire 70 N. Pioneer Street owned by Jehovah Witness Lowell Oregon Congregation.
- Approved motions to authorize the City Administrator to negotiate real estate option agreements for two tax lots located at the NE corner of Main and Moss Street owned by Gerald and Shirley Dilley, and one tax lot on Main Street owned by John and Keely Riggs, and to pursue grant funding.

All actions were approved 3-0; In favor Don Bennett, Gail Harris, Patricia Angelini; Maggie Osgood absent. Work session:

• Topics discussed were the Public Safety Report and the Annual Facility Maintenance Report.

At the December 18th regular meeting:

- Approved a Professional Services Contract with The Urban Collaborative.
- Approved Resolution 709—A Resolution Canvassing Results of the November 6th General Election
- Approved a 4% increase in salary and additional one week vacation for the City Administrator
- Approved providing employees with a \$50 gift card
